Dear Friends,

Several years ago I came into contact with a man who taught religious studies at one of our State Universities. While his area of expertise was Old Testament history, he loved entering into candid discussions on topics such as church doctrine and systematic theology. He even lead a research project that attempted to measure the influence faith had when people are faced with major, lifechanging decisions.

I remember attending a meeting where several church leaders were discussing the positive influence his work had on the religious community. They even went so far as to marvel at the depths of his faith. Somehow they had missed the fact he was a professing atheist! So, why had he dedicated his life to becoming an expert on Biblical history? When I asked him that very question he replied: It's interesting. One doesn't have to believe it to teach it. Besides, I'm just more honest than many of the people who sit in the pews. They don't believe it all, either.

On the one hand, what he said was offensive. How could he imply that those who help support the work of the church are not faithful believers? On the other hand, maybe we do need to ask ourselves if what we profess to believe is being lived out in what we do and say. As Jesus' disciples are we following his commandments to feed the poor, welcome the alien, and spread the good news wherever we go? Do we honestly expect to see Jesus within the ordinary happenings of our day? If we are Easter people, how does his resurrection affect the way we live in this world? According to The Rev. Dr. James C. Howell, Easter people are about showing God's love with other people, especially those who don't know or don't get it, or have been misled into thinking Christianity is a problem, or less than it could be . . . So, do we believe it? Do we honestly believe "He's got the whole world in his hands"? If so, let's live it out in all that we do.

FRETSA UPDATE

It's time for an update on FRETSA and it's happenings. With so many new families in church, I felt it might be good to give a little background first...

Several years ago First Methodist was "gifted" with a small portion of a large estate, designated not to STAY with the church, but to be passed on to the community in a mission based, social concerns area. After study, the Foundation (recipient of the annual gift) decided to use it in the area of homelessness, which had been the main area of concern in the benefactor's mind. Her wishes were that FUMC would also step up and add to the amount of her gift.

It was quickly apparent that this was way too much for one church to handle, so the Foundation turned to Franklin County Emergency Temporary Shelter Association, a 501c(3) entity already working in the area of homelessness. FRETSA had almost no funding but could offer case workers, access to the homeless of the area, and general expertise in working with the homeless, since its Board was made up of various churches, ECKAN, Willow Domestic Violence Center, Hope House, Communities in Schools, Layton Mental Health Center and United Way...all agencies already familiar with the homeless problem.

And so the ties between FUMC and FRETSA was born. Thanks to a church member, FRETSA was offered a home for a 5 year period...this became Roseberry House. This past year marked the end of that 5 year period, so Roseberry House moved to a different location...a mobile home which had been given to FRETSA when the owner passed, and the heirs gifted it to help the homeless.

After a successful fundraiser, a second unit was purchased by FRETSA. This one is called "Palmer House" after the family whose generosity put us over the top and made its purchase possible.

Telephone: 785-242-1419 Email: ottawafumc@gmail.com Of course we are overjoyed to offer two units, but this means rent and utilities for both, as well as insurance and repairs. We learned quickly that both homes will always be in use, and that there will always be a waiting list of applicants. And expenses do always carry on, regardless of how carefully FRETSA budgets its money.

The original stipulation for this church to be involved is always on our mind as we think of the missions of this congregation. So, we will again be designating one Sunday of each quarter as "FRETSA SUNDAY", a time when you have the opportunity to share in giving to this work with the homeless. As Christ said, "The fields are white with harvest, but the workers are far too few."

Next month I will share with you the basic precepts of FRETSA, and how it differs from other groups helping with the homeless. Until then, don't forget that if you buy from Amazon, go to smile.amazon.com/ch/20-1983931 and Amazon donates a portion of your purchase to FRETSA.
